Session D: Cultivating a Community of Talk in in Classrooms

Language is how we think and process information. If we want to create a classroom culture filled with thinking, we need to get students talking! A lot has been said about "accountable talk" - building these practices allows students to not only accurately and appropriately express their own ideas, but also respond and further develop others' ideas. In this class, we will work together to discuss the importance of talk in the classroom. Join Gravity Goldberg, LLC staff developer Pam Koutrakos in an exploration of how read aloud is an ideal springboard for modeling and practicing sophisticated discussion. You will also discuss and practice different whole-class discussion techniques and routines, as well as learn methods for choosing, setting up, and eventually stepping back from reading partnerships, uncovering and practicing strategies to support amazing collaboration and conversation among students

Session E: Writing about Reading that Makes Sense!

Session G: Teaching Theme and Interpretation through Components of Balanced Literacy

When we read books, we need to push readers to think about more than what's happening in that exact text at that exact moment. Readers today need to think more globally, in terms of larger truths or themes. Some of that instruction can happen in our daily conferences and minilessons, while other parts of this learning lies in other components of Balanced Literacy: namely shared reading and read aloud. Ramsey literacy coach Erica Lakind will provide strategies that can be implemented immediately to help readers grow to be interpretive and critical consumers of texts.

Session M: The Focus of It is Structure: Improving Reading and Writing through a Close Study of Structure

When we carefully analyze the structures of text we learn about how ideas are developed and packaged in unique ways. Explore the work of close reading for structure with Kim Clancey and Laurie Hemmerly to dive into deeper and deeper comprehension, while pushing yourself past story mountains and 5-paragraph essays. It will add power to your reading, your writing, and your teaching!
